A Letter from the Alumni President



Brothers:

Unlike the past several fall newsletters, I'm not here to share that things are all positive unfortunately.

Greek houses in Champaign are confronting a challenge. The county has re-assessed properties around the campus, which resulted in many fraternities and sororities seeing significant increases to their property taxes, us included. We are in the middle of the pack, having seen our taxes double this year. Several fraternities had increases more than this, with one house having an increase that exceeded 300 percent! This is driven mostly by all the new development going on in Campustown.

Our board is actively working with fellow house corporations on campus through an organized group called the Greek Alumni Corporation Board Association (GACBA) that meets in Chicago. In addition to having retained a firm to appeal our taxes, we are pursuing avenues at both the local and state levels to address this issue.

In the near term, though, the unfortunate result for us is that our break-even occupancy level in the house went up by about two men. That's significant and obviously impacts our financial situation. As we move toward refinancing the mortgage next year, things like this affect us more than we would like.

On a very positive note, I am pleased to share some well-deserved compliments to our undergraduate

Alumni Spotlight:

Guy H. Allen '81

Editor's Note: For this edition of the newsletter, we're shining the spotlight on Brother Guy Allen '81. As an active member, he served the chapter as pontifex and junior tribune. After graduating with a degree in Agricultural Economics, Guy pursued a career in grain and feed. His work has led him to international business and a dual-citizenship between the US and Australia. Currently working in risk management and commodities with Advance Trading Inc., Guy has overseen a restructure and expansion of the company operations based out of Australia. Guy and his wife, Jun He, share two children: Mary Lurena (3 1/2 years old) and William Henry (16 months old). For fun, he enjoys farming, exploring history and family genealogy, ballroom and country/western dancing, and cruising on his Harley.



What led you to you join the fraternity back in school?

I grew up in a small rural Illinois town and a high school of 200 students, 54 in my graduating class. At the time when preparing to enter university, the University of Illinois seemed like a very large and diverse institution. I wanted to live in organized housing with a group of people who had common interests and backgrounds. Going through spring rush, I found a group of people at KΔP with whom I had much in common and felt very comfortable.

What are your favorites memories from your time as an active Eta member?

I enjoyed the diversity of people within KΔP and appreciated the structured social activities: attending university varsity sporting events (particularly football, ice hockey, volleyball, and wrestling), intramural sports, and social dances (disco was big back then, along with the "Urban Cowboy" craze).

The weekly running of the chapter GC Award was also a frequent and memorable event (probably wouldn't allow such an event these days).

How has working with grain captivated your interest?

I enjoy the

commodity trade, because it is an international business/market/trade with a long history of well over 2,000 years that is based in the grass-roots production of agriculture to supply the basic human needs of food and fiber.

What was your first trip to Australia like?

I was first offered the opportunity to come to Australia in 1992 by Louis Dreyfus Commodities (LDC). I had been working in Kansas City at the time and basically accepted the opportunity when it was discussed on a Friday afternoon immediately, on the spot.

I had never been to Australia before, so it was setting out on a new life adventure.

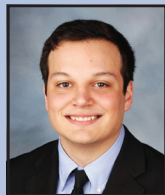
Similarly in 2007, LDC again sought me out and offered me an opportunity to work in Beijing, China. Another significant opportunity for a life-changing experience.

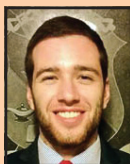

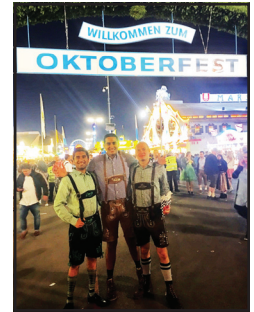

an Australian citizen, holding dual citizenship with the USA. It seemed a bit odd to swear allegiance to the Queen again after our dispute with England back 1776.

What are your thoughts on GMO products?

I have no problem with GMO crops and their related products. It is a great tool/technology that can advance food production well into the future, not unlike the advance in hybrid seed production in the early 1900s.

However, many people do not understand the underlying science, and I realize many people feel differently about the subject.

As such, GMO products should be appropriately labeled, giving consumers a choice and letting the market place determine the value and the outcome.

How do you stay in touch with your KAP brothers today?

The modern technologies of email and the internet have made the world a significantly smaller place. In the last four years, I have

found that Facebook is particularly a great tool for keeping in touch with family and friends from around the world. I have been happy to reconnect with so many of them. My three-year-old daughter speaks to her grandparents overseas on a weekly basis via a video chat.

Outside of work, what do you do for fun?

Being a late starter, two young children now keep me very busy. Having a family at 55 is different than at 25. I also enjoy the farm, a garden, and an orchard, along with a variety of livestock around the farm: cattle, chickens, ducks, geese, and a dog.
