No specific changes or visible progress have been made to date. That said, the Greek Alumni Corporation Board Association (GACBA) continues to meet and organizationally is an important means for all of the alumni volunteer boards to bring our issues and concerns to light.

On your next visit to Champaign, you will find that our neighborhood continues to change. The new Kappa Delta Sorority house is complete, and we welcome our new neighbors. For many of you, that was the former Delta Sigma Phi Fraternity house at the end of the block. For others among you, that property was a rental occupied by Chi Psi Fraternity. The latest change on the horizon: the former Tau Epsilon Phi Fraternity house across the street from us was sold a few years ago to Delta Sigma Phi, and they are now selling that property. We will have to wait and see whether the new purchaser will be a Greek organization or whether a new apartment building will be built on our block.

Your board continues to monitor developments on campus and how those developments potentially impact us. At the same time, we actively work with the undergraduate chapter leadership to focus on recruitment and the importance of keeping the house full. The ongoing support from each of you annually is important and makes a difference as we plan to support the chapter and to maintain our campus home.

Bobby Gene McCormick 79

Editor's Note: For this edition of the newsletter, we're shining the spotlight on Brother Bob McCormick '79. From the hometown of Champaign, Illinois, Bob is a longtime resident of Beavercreek, Ohio. He and his wife, Helen (Bee), a retired teacher and active volunteer in the community, have raised two successful daughters: Rebecca, an archivist at National Archives in DC, and Kara, a math teacher in Beavercreek, Ohio. While an undergraduate member of Eta, Bob served the chapter as senior tribune and junior tribune and was on the executive council during his senior year. His dedication to $K\Delta P$ continues today; he was recently elected to the $K\Delta P$ National Board of Directors at this year's Convention and is currently serving on the finance committee. He also supports Habitat for Humanity, Big Brothers, and the Airmen's Fund. A 28-year career in the US Air Force earned him many honors, including being awarded Air Force Senior Analyst of the Year. Much of his work was as an operations research analyst and also as a chief analyst for sustainment for several years. Before a September retirement from government, Bob was leading a supply-chain planning systems and process group. Today, Bob is consulting part-time, enjoying some golf and tennis, and his long-time hobby, ham radio.


As for the game, Purdue ended up winning by a wide margin, so we can only hope for next year. We hope to see everyone at the 2019 Homecoming for another great event!





ULifeline is a web resource available to these brothers, as well as to officers, roommates, or pledge brothers who are concerned about a brother and don't know where to turn. The National Fraternity has partnered with the

Kappa Delta Rho Foundation, supported by the generous support of alumni, parents, and friends, to fund the program.

One life cut short is too many. Kappa Delta Rho has averaged at least one suicide per year for the last ten years. Through Brothers' Keeper, $K\Delta P$ is among a small handful of fraternal organizations leading the charge to respond to this crises and to put resources at the disposal of our brothers.

What inspired you to pursue a master's degree?

I had been at Wright-Patterson for a few months and considered returning to Illinois for a degree in industrial engineering. The course material was relevant to my work, so I met with one of the engineering deans, who supported acceptance into the program. I weighed the options between returning to school as a full-time employee and continuing to work. The compromise — I needed the money — was to enter a Master's in Management Science (operations research) program at the University of Dayton. That changed my career direction and was one of the best (and luckiest) decisions I made.

During your career, which achievements are you most proud of?

This doesn't sound exciting, but we implemented new approaches for supply-chain planning and execution: what parts to buy or repair, where to stock parts, etc. The challenges included introducing new methodologies, addressing culture change, and implementing new IT systems. The impact was to reduce by half the number of airplanes waiting for parts. That's a huge impact on readiness.

Why do you feel it's important to remain involved with KΔP as an alumnus?

KΔP gave me a college home, life-long friends, and experiences that helped me as a person. I think it's important to help to sustain the ideals and opportunities that have been valuable to so many.

How have the needs of the fraternity changed on the national level?

KΔP National plays a much more active role today than it did when I was an undergraduate. The needs of the fraternity reflect changes in society, such as generational change and increased awareness of many issues, such as a growing suicide problem, sexual assault, and diversity. These affect both the fraternity's mission and its relevancy.

How do you spend your free time these days?

I just retired, so I have a lot more free time recently. I will continue to work part-time as a consultant, but I have more time for my hobbies (tennis, ham radio), volunteering, and fun travel.

When did you discover ham radio, and what type of format do you utilize?

I was a seventh grader and had to sign up for a weekly "activity." Two of the math teachers, Mr. Vokac and Mr. Wallace, taught a ham-radio license course. It sounded more interesting than audio-visual club, so I signed

up and passed the FCC test. There are lots of modes (voice, video, various digital modes), but I tend to use Morse code, the oldest digital mode, more than others.

What advice can you give your fellow alumni and young undergrads about values?

That's a dangerous question. The short version of what I told my folks at work was pretty straight forward; show up, take care of the basics, and look for opportunities to make what you do better. It's important to be committed to what you do, to bring some passion for the job (or whatever you're doing), and don't be afraid to take chances.
