Alumni Spotlight: Thomas Kennedy '11



How did you end up at Illinois and joining $K\Delta P$?

Prior to my senior year of high school, I was 100% sure that I wanted to go to one of the military academies. That summer, my parents took me on a whirlwind tour of the East Coast, driving to 10 colleges in nine days. On the last day, we were driving back to Springfield through Champaign at 2:00 a.m., and my mom said, "Wouldn't it be funny if we just drove a couple thousand miles looking at colleges and you ended up going to school 1.5 hours away from home?" That all but confirmed that I would be a Fighting Illini!

As for how I joined $K\Delta P$, I owe that to meeting a couple of people on my floor from Jacksonville, Illinois: Jon Wardell, Scott Runyon, and Brian Jarzen. They had a friend from high school, Justin Gifford, who had joined $K\Delta P$ the year before. Justin invited all of us to join one Wednesday afternoon for "Logo Glass Day" at Murphy's. Over the second half of my first semester in college, I spent most Wednesday afternoons casually hanging out with the $K\Delta Ps$ at Murphy's. The strange thing was that I had never even been to the $K\Delta P$ house. The first week back on campus that January, some people were going over to the house to hang out, and I received my bid to join the fraternity the first time I had ever stepped through the door of the house. Kevin Klemm and Chad Rushing, my roommates and friends from high school, received their bids, too. When I was talking to my parents about joining, one of their big concerns was how it would impact my grades, which were nothing to write home about my first semester. The major selling point for the house was the fact that the house was ranked sixth academically the semester before and filled with a lot of social but academically successful engineers who I said would be a great asset to improve my grades (which did actually happen).

What was your engagement or officer role in the chapter? Any favorite memories?

While I was in the house, I held three leadership positions. My first position was as centurion, which was the highest-ranking position I could run for without having lived in the house. This position then led to me running for and being elected to

the Interfraternity Council (IFC) Judicial Board, the group responsible for the discipline portion of IFC's governance of their fraternities. When I was older in the house, I served as the undergraduate representative on the alumni board, later transitioning to a director position on the board while I was in grad school and my first year out of school.

Out of all of the memories from $K\Delta P$, my favorite was during the second semester of my sophomore year when we were paired up with Alpha Omicron Pi for the Atius Mom's Day Sing, a song and dance competition for Mom's Day. Out of all of the people from $K\Delta P$ that participated, I'm not sure a single one of us really had any decent dancing skills, but that didn't stop us from putting it all out there and embarrassing ourselves. That year, we won second place in the competition for our take on a Michael Jackson version of "West Side Story," but a second-place award wasn't what I remember most. I was somehow selected to be the lead from $K\Delta P$ with Jessica Lipski as the lead from AOII. In true storybook fashion, the two of us started dating halfway through the competition, and in August this year we celebrated 10 years of marriage together.

What has your career path been? Would brothers know or be touched by any of your work?

At the end of my undergraduate career, I had no job prospects and didn't really know what to do with my life. Thankfully, my advisor knew of an open graduate research position for John Deere. I decided that it was better than going back to live at my parent's house without a job, and who can argue with a free master's degree and another two years on campus hanging out at $K\Delta P$?

After finishing my master's degree, I went to work for John Deere in Dubuque, Iowa, where I was both a design and test engineer for the construction and forestry division. After a couple of years working for Deere, I earned a spot on Deere's University of Illinois recruiting team. As part of that volunteer team, I attend the engineering career fairs in the fall and spring and represent the company at the Engineering Open House. Typically, I reach out to the house on the Facebook group a day or two before the career fair, and I'm always impressed to see one or two people come up to me at the career fair to let me know they are from $K\Delta P$ and would appreciate any opportunities or advice I can help out with. I feel like $K\Delta P$ has had a significant impact on the "pay it forward" perspective that I have developed over the years.

My current position at John Deere is as the thermal management architect for John Deere Electric Powertrain. The majority of my work is developing technical strategy for the company in my area and mentoring other engineers. Looking back, there are a lot of $K\Delta Ps$ that I owe for helping get

me through fluid dynamics and thermodynamics classes with passing grades. Some of my proudest accomplishments at Deere include the design or test of the new Skid Steer, 4WD Loader, and Backhoe product lines; ten patent awards; and the redesign of our Engineering Explorer's program, a program that introduces high school students to engineering fields. John Deere also enabled me to complete an MBA at the Kelley School of Business at Indiana University. Even though I am also technically a Hoosier, I'll always be rooting for the Illini!

Have you stayed in touch with any classmates or other $K\Delta P$ brothers?

I have stayed in touch with a lot of classmates over the years, and when I got married, five of my $K\Delta P$ brothers stood up in my wedding (Chad Rushing, Zach Gooding, Josh Bates, Luke Durand, and Scott Runyon), and four of my wife's AOΠ sorority sisters accompanied her. Out of all of the $K\Delta P$ brothers that attended that event, two went above and beyond to be a part of it: Sean Martin, currently a Major in the Army, got out of field training early and booked a flight less than 24 hours before the wedding to be there, and Jon Whitney, currently a Lt. Commander in the Navy, traveled all the way from Japan to Chicago to be a part of the festivities. Over the years, some of us have drifted apart more than others, but when we do get together for a wedding, a bachelor party, or a baseball game, no time has passed, and we are still as good of friends as when we were in college. The only difference is there are now many spouses and kids added to the $K\Delta P$ family.

My wife and I have two children, Michael (age seven) and Andrew (age five). Having lived in Iowa for about 10 years, Jess and I have consistently battled the risk of our boys becoming Hawkeye fans. We do our best to dress them in orange and blue and expose them to as much Fighting Illini spirit as we can. With any hope, Michael and Andrew will be part of the University of Illinois Classes of 2037 and 2039. We are also hopeful that they will grow up to be $K\Delta P$ Gentlemen and that the house is still as strong as it was when I was there.
