A Letter from the Alumni President



Brothers:

In my last letter, I discussed the challenge that we and other Greek houses in Champaign are facing with the property-tax reassessment that took place. You might recall that our taxes doubled, which places a significant financial burden on our organization. This issue is a major focus for the board right now. Here is an update.

Unfortunately, the tax appeal route was not a viable option, because a small group of Greek houses sold property in the current market and benefited from the higher property values. Thus, we could not show that the reassessed value was out of line and the appeal became a dead end.

On a positive note, the Greek Alumni Corporation Board Association (GACBA), through contacts in the Illinois legislature, was able to get some discussion going among lawmakers about the need to keep student housing affordable and how the large tax increases negatively impact this objective. One possible solution would be a law that eliminates property taxes for qualifying non-profit student organizations, including Greek housing. Indiana already has a law similar to this. The GACBA is working with the university to gain its support too. Having such a law would be huge for us and would help control the cost of student housing that a non-profit organization like ours provides.

Those alumni who are registered to vote in Illinois can help out with this effort by contacting their respective legislators and expressing the need to address this issue. Should this move to a point where a bill is presented and more organized assistance is

Alumni Spotlight: **LAWRENCE JAGNOW '63**

Editor's Note: For this edition of the newsletter, we're shining the spotlight on **Larry Jagnow '63**. From the hometown of Moline, Illinois, Larry graduated with a degree in journalism, and later joined the US Army in April 1966. Commissioned a second lieutenant, Signal Corps, in March 1967, he served a one-year tour in Vietnam, October 1967-'68, and retired from the Army in May 1969. A career in public relations and journalism kept Larry's creative side alive and well. An accomplished writer, Larry recently published his second Richard Silk detective mystery, *The Unitarian Murder*. He also stays busy in his community as a volunteer with Clinica Amistad, a free health-care clinic serving the underserved in the greater Tucson area. Larry and his wife, Anne, have been married for 55 years now, and they share two children, Lauren and William. In his free time, Larry enjoys spending time with his grandchildren, Veronica and Joshua. He also enjoys painting, working on his model railroad project, and playing golf.

What was the chapter like when you joined?

When I pledged KΔP in the fall of 1961 as a junior transfer, Eta Chapter had a very successful pledge enrollment. If I remember correctly, our pledge class totaled 22 members. Pledges and actives were very enthusiastic, having a number of events, such as dances and social gatherings. KΔP also participated in every intramural sport. Back then, we also had an active-versus-pledge touch-football game in late November, and upset of upsets, we pledges won the game.

Why do you remain involved as an alumnus today?

I remain involved as an alum with the local Tucson Illini Alumni Club, because attending

the University of Illinois and being a member of KΔP helped me become who I am today. My education was great; the entire Illini experience was something I treasure and will never forget.

After graduation, how did you apply your Journalism degree?

I applied my Journalism degree immediately out of college, joining a weekly newspaper chain in Grayslake, Illinois, as sports editor and page-one editor. From there, I went to a trade magazine in Madison, Wisconsin, as an associate editor. After joining the US Army and serving as an officer in Vietnam, I went into public relations for Western Electric Company. I dropped out of

URGENT!

We need Kappa Delta Rho alumni to contact their Illinois State Legislators today regarding the cost of student housing, including fraternity and sorority houses.

As you might know, property taxes for fraternity and sorority chapter houses have skyrocketed over the last several years. Assessments have gone up anywhere between 100 to 300 percent.

As a result, the Illinois Greek Alumni

Corporation Board has engaged Illinois legislators to consider modifications to the existing statute. We are pleased to share that several state legislators prepared a draft bill (HB 4914), proposing to eliminate property taxes for qualifying non-profit student organizations, including greek housing. This draft is a start to the conversation.

full-time work for a year to write fiction but, not being successful with that, joined International Harvester in public relations. Later, I worked for Loyola University of Chicago, then Advocate Health Care, Chicago, and finally, Ancilla Systems, Hobart, Indiana. I completed my career as a senior vice president with that seven-hospital system. But always, writing was my strength and enabled me to advance in a variety of settings.

Why did you transition into the health-care industry?

I transitioned into health-care because I always wanted to be in a job where I felt the job and organization I worked for was doing something positive for people.

Which moments are you most proud of in your career?

The proudest moment in my career came toward the end of my working days, when I was named a senior vice president for Ancilla Systems. In addition to heading up public relations, I was named the system's compliance officer. I also oversaw four low-income,

senior-housing projects, the quality-survey process, and development efforts.


After retirement, what inspired you to take up writing again?

Thank you for your support, and I hope everyone has an enjoyable and safe summer with family and friends.


